## Clustered Sampling

- Most probability samples in surveying are based on one (or more) of three ideas:
  - □ SRS without replacement
  - Stratified sampling (break population into groups, do an SRS in each group)
  - Clustered sampling (break popilation into groups, take an SRS of the groups)
