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Research Question: The purpose of our survey is to measure how prevalent internet piracy is among Carnegie Mellon students. In conjunction, we hope to learn how aware students are of recently proposed changes to internet piracy laws and what views students hold with respect to piracy activity. Specifically, we want to know what proportion of students have engaged in piracy, how often they do it, what types of content they download, and what types of web resources they typically use. People who claim to not engage in piracy are also of major interest. We want to gain insight into what attitudes people hold towards piracy and what prevents them from downloading pirated content. Our survey hopefully will establish whether the people who do not pirate feel compelled to refrain because of some ethical or legal obligation, or because of other less principled reasons. Of course, we are collecting demographic information from our respondents to prevent any confounding, and we may even learn about piracy behavior differences between demographic groups. Boiled down to a question, our survey hopes to answer: "To what extent do CMU undergraduate students engage in internet piracy and what are their views on related copyright enforcement legislation?"

great to approach people in the lib Pretesting: We handed out our survey with the questions we submitted in part II.4 ('Old Questions') to six undergraduates we approached in the library. We initially approached 9 students, but three chose not to participate; the uniform reason of rejection among non-respondents was that they did not have time to spare to complete the survey. Our observed 66% response rate is far higher than we expect to achieve when administering the survey electronically, but in-person administration allowed for more direct and effective feedback, so any disparity between pretesting response rates and actual response rates is acceptable to us. Out of the six respondents, one was a freshman, two were sophomores, one a junior, and two were seniors. Since our population is undergraduate students at Carnegie Mellon, these six students were highly representative of the population (missing only 5<sup>th</sup> year undergrads, who comprise a comparatively small population subset). There were no overwhelming ethnic/political majorities among the six that may have created an inconsistency with the population. Based on Professor Junker's feedback and the feedback from our pretest subjects, we made appropriate changes to our questions (see 'Revised Questions').

Some of the respondents suggested that the order of the questions was not optimal. With our old order, respondents who put 'no' for the question asking about their piracy history were excluded

from answering many questions in the rest of the survey. Based on this suggestion, we changed the order of some of the questions and also changed the phrasing to accommodate for those who have not engaged in piracy. For example, Q7 is now worded 'What type of content do you, or would you,....'. Including the "would you" phrase enables people who do not pirate to answer this question.

To ensure that people who respond 'No' to Q1 understand the subject matter our survey addresses, we have included simple summaries of the bills in question. In order to maintain consistency, respondents who respond 'Yes' to Q1 will also see these summaries. However, the summaries will appear after Q1, so we will still hopefully receive accurate responses to our initial query measuring preexisting awareness of the proposed legislation.

Regarding question 5, we received feedback from one respondent that "less socially acceptable" seemed leading. Revision: "If the US adopted a tougher stance on internet piracy enforcement, would your attitudes about using pirated content change: not at all, a little, somewhat, or a lot?" Here, we are assuming that changes in official policy will reflect (or enact) some change in social opinion of a behavior, allowing us to measure a similar effect as the original question, but without the risk of conditioning a respondent's thinking. This also helps assess whether people feel there is some connection between piracy laws and their individual behavior.

One respondent reported Question 7 to be confusing, complaining that the meaning of the question was "ambiguous". The respondent originally thought that if one knew the content was being reproduced illegally, then this question was irrelevant and did not measure anything. After explaining the logic behind the question, the respondent quickly understood what we were aiming to discover. That said, the initial confusion the respondent experienced led us to believe the question required rewording.

Another suggestion addressed the ambiguity of the word 'usually', which led us to replace it with more precise language in a few questions. We also received criticism that questions 8-10 on our old survey are very similar and we needed to make them more distinguishable. As a result, we changed the language for those questions (now 10-12), and also included a series of example scenarios to test respondents' attitudes towards different types of piracy.
