#### **How to Access DLAR Animal Facilities**

- Research personnel who need access to the animal facilities must carry their own applicable University or UPMC IDs at all times.
- To obtain access to DLAR animal facilities, personnel must provide a request form to the DLAR by fax to 412/648-8449 or by email to <u>dlar@pitt.edu</u>. Approval is contingent upon being listed on an active, approved IACUC protocol and receiving a site-specific tour and training (these can be arranged by contacting the DLAR office or facility supervisor).

#### **Animal Program Security Issues**

- Animal extremist organizations, individuals, or agencies have been known to use the following tactics to deter the use of animals in biomedical research:
  - 1. Staff/student/faculty infiltration
  - 2. Phone harassment
  - 3. Email attacks or other electronic media attacks
  - 4. Postal attacks
  - 5. Public relations attacks
  - 6. Damage to facilities
